End of KS1 Assessments

- At the end of Key Stage 1 (KS1) teacher assessment judgements will be made in order to report on the attainment and progress of your child in English reading, English writing and mathematics.
- In order to make these teacher assessment judgements, the work that that your child has produced throughout the year is assessed against a series of 'pupil can' statements for reading, writing, and mathematics.

End of KS1 Assessments

- These statements determine whether your child is:
- Working at a pre-key stage 1 standard (PKF)
- Working towards the expected standard (WTS)
- Working at the expected standard (EXS)
- Working at greater depth (GDS)
- These assessment judgements will also take into account your child's performance in national curriculum tests (often referred to as SATs).

KS1 SATS

- KS1 SATS must be taken at some time during May 2023.
- There are KS1 SATS in English reading, English grammar, punctuation and spelling and maths.
- There are no KS1 SATS for English writing.
- The KS1 SATS for English grammar, punctuation and spelling is not compulsory and so we will not be administering it.
- These teacher assessment judgements will be reported to you in your child's end of year report.

 - 20 marks
 - approximately 30 minutes
- Reading Paper 2 Text and separate answer booklet
 - 20 marks
 - approximately 40 minutes




Mathematics Tests

- Maths Paper 1 Arithmetic
 - 25 marks
 - approximately 20 minutes
- Maths Paper 2 Reasoning
 - 35 marks
 - approximately 35 minutes

Scaled Scores

- Teachers mark the KS1 tests and calculate the raw score that each child achieves for each test. These raw scores will then be converted into a scaled score.
- Tests are developed each year to the same specification, but because the questions must be different, the difficulty of tests may vary slightly each year. This means we need to convert the raw scores children get in the tests into a scaled score, to ensure we can make accurate comparisons of pupil performance over time.

Scaled Scores

- A scaled score of 100 will always represent the expected standard on the test. The tests do not measure for 'greater depth'.
- Please remember that at KS1 it is a teacher assessment judgement.
- Your child may achieve 100 but be teacher assessed as 'Working towards the Expected Standard'.
- Your child may achieve less than 100 but be teacher assessed as 'Working at the Expected Standard'.

- The writing that your child has produced throughout the year is assessed against the series of 'pupil can' statements for English writing.
